Temporary power cables can be run through cable trays if proper safety, grounding, and installation practices are followed according to OSHA and NEC standards.

Regulatory Compliance

Temporary wiring is governed by OSHA standards, which require that temporary electrical installations of 600 volts or less be used only for construction, maintenance, repair, or emergency purposes, and removed immediately upon completion of the project . Cables must be rated for hard or extra-hard usage and comply with the National Electrical Code (NEC), particularly Article 392 for cable trays . For installations over 600 volts, access must be restricted to qualified personnel with appropriate guarding .

Cable Tray Considerations

Cable trays provide an organized and efficient method for routing temporary power cables, especially in high-density or high-traffic areas . Ladder trays are preferred for power cables due to superior ventilation, while solid-bottom trays offer protection from debris but reduce heat dissipation . Proper tray fill limits must be calculated to prevent overheating and maintain ampacity . Metallic trays require grounding and bonding to ensure electrical continuity and safety .
